Building Grassroots Power through Food Sovereignty: the experience of the U.S. Food Sovereignty Alliance



Abstract

The **US Food Sovereignty Alliance (USFSA)** is a nation-wide network of grassroots groups and grassroots supportive organizations. Created in 2009, the Alliance emerges as the response of US allies to the root causes of the 2008 global food crisis.

In this talk, **Saulo** will share with us how this volunteer-run space has challenged the dominant narratives around food and agriculture in the US, and the structures that have prevented grassroots organizations and grassroots supportive organizations to build power. And how to move from tactical to strategic space is one of the questions in the praxis of the **USFSA**.

Saulo Araujo is the director of Global Movements Program in **WhyHunger**, a 41-year old grassroots supportive organization based in New York City. **Saulo** works to advance initiatives of food sovereignty and agroecology by identifying resources and network opportunities that will strengthen the work of grassroots organizations and social movements.
